Dear HPPC Family,

Some of you may have heard the story of the blind men and the elephant, but I think it may be a perfect tale to revisit as we prepare for this back-to-school and intense political season.

The story goes like this... A group of blind men heard that a strange animal, called an elephant, had been brought to the town, but none of them were aware of its shape and form. Out of curiosity, they said, "We must inspect and know it by touch, of which we are capable." So, they sought it out, and when they found it, they groped it.

The first person whose hand landed on the trunk said, "This being is like a thick snake." For another whose hand reached its ear, it seemed like "a kind of fan." Another person whose hand was upon its leg said, "The elephant is a pillar like a tree trunk." The blind man who placed his hand upon its side said the elephant "is a wall." Another who felt its tail, described it as "a rope." The last person felt its tusk and stated, "The elephant is that which is hard, smooth and like a spear." They were all correct in their observations, and yet, individually, they did not quite have a full grasp of what an elephant was or what it looked like.

Albert Einstein said "Curiosity is more than knowledge." As we prepare to return to school and as we steady ourselves for the political turmoil headed our way (and is truly already here), I urge all of us to stay curious. Take time to listen and consider perspectives not our own. Ask questions and be willing to seek out possibilities by working together for a fuller view of what lies ahead for all of us.

As people of faith, curiosity is something that should bring us great comfort. I think all of us may have seen or felt a glimpse of God, but we simply are not able to see or know the fullness of God. It is in this mystery that we learn, grow and seek to do good work together.


