My prayers is that we keep considering and keep asking ourselves... does who we say we are and how we live our lives match up?

We are the hands and feet of Christ in this world. We won't get it right every time, but we can certainly keep trying.

Church Happenings NEWS



January Session Highlights

- Kathryn Roberts met with the group and expressed her desire to join the church. She was welcomed by all.
- Alan gave an update on his work to help fund the food pantry. He has listed our food pantry on Amplify Austin, a website that opens avenues for organizations to receive money. Although giving can begin as early as January 29th, if one waits to donate on March 6th, the funds will be matched. Prizes are also available. He also has made a Facebook page for the food pantry.
- Doris presented the financial report for December and the year 2024. The church received two large donations in December designated for the food pantry.
- Emily will be out on February 23rd as she is leading a Women's Retreat at Westminster Presbyterian Church.
- Emily and her family will be out March 17th -21st for Spring Break.
- The future of the food pantry was discussed at length. It was decided to continue keeping it open weekly with some changes. Those wanting food will be given a list of food available and will only receive what they indicate that they need. No one will be allowed to enter the food pantry area but will be asked to wait in the living room.
- Several ideas were mentioned about ways to fund the food pantry this year including:
 - 1. Involving the neighborhood;
 - 2. Taking up money on communion Sundays for the food pantry;
 - 3. Henry will continue to look into grants; and
 - 4. Take up an offering on Christmas Eve designated to the food pantry.
- It was decided to drop Mobile Loaves and Fishes from our benevolences as they are very well funded and to replace that with the Food Pantry.
- The budget for 2025 was presented by Henry and approved by the session. It will be presented to the congregation on January 26th.
- Emily has purchased a book for a Lenten book study entitled "Turning Over the Tables: A Lenten Call for Disrupting Power" by Kathy Escobar. More information to follow.
- Esther graciously sent out 13 cards in November and 9 in December.
- Thank you to Bennie and Karen for getting us prepared for the cold weather.
- Karen signed a couple up for a wedding in May.
- Thank you to Juan Manuel and all who sang for the beautiful Cantata.



Valentine's Day Around the World



We are used to celebrating Valentine's Day with cards, candy, and exchanging sweet sentiments with those we love. Countries around the globe celebrate the holiday in different, unique ways (and sometimes on different dates). Below are a few of the fun traditions from around the world.

Columbia and Guatemala: Valentine's Day is called the Day of Love and Friendship. Romance is less of the focus in these countries. Friends give anonymous gifts to one another and residents of Guatemala City have a parade in honor of senior citizens while wearing bright colors and traditional Mayan clothing.



Denmark: Men write *gaekkebrevs*, or "joke letters," similar to anonymous cards from secret admirers. They are funny poems on creatively cut-out pieces of paper signed with dots representing the letters of their name. The recipient tries to guess the author. If she does, the admirer gives her an egg at Easter. If she can't guess correctly, the admirer reveals his identity on Easter.



Philippines: Valentine's goes in a completely different direction. Mayors across the nation perform mass weddings for up to hundreds of couples. They are referred to as the "wedding of the city." Some mayors offer compensation for childbirth for married couples in the future, money to start their new lives together, and financial rewards on milestone anniversary dates.



Italy: Couples don't just exchange boxes of chocolate but give *baci perugina*, which are filled with hazelnut and baci means "kisses" in Italian. Every candy has a love note written inside in five languages. Another Italian tradition is that the first man a single woman spots on Valentine's Day will become her husband within a year.



Wales: Valentine's starts early and is celebrated on Dwynwen's Day on January 25th. St. Dwynwen is the patron saint of lovers. Some go to local carving shops on the day to craft love spoons. This tradition dates back to when love-sick Welsh sailors carved designs into their spoons to give to their loved ones upon returning home.



Japan: Valentine's Day is divided into two days. On February 14th, women give male friends and co-workers *giri-choco*, an obligatory chocolate gift, and *honmei-choco* ("true-feeling chocolate") to those they care about. Men return the favor on March 14th, known as "White Day" with white chocolate and other valuable gifts.
